# Application Process - Pre-Application Research

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- Finalize College list
  - Good fit for student
  - Safety, Target, Reach
- Determine deadlines - check school websites
  - Deadline Types (link):*
    - Early Decision
    - Early Action
    - Regular Decision
    - Rolling Admissions

# Application Process - Standard Requirements

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- **Complete all college applications**
  - Main types - Common App ([guide](#)), Coalition App, individual school applications
  - Supplements
- **Write College Essay**
  - Student's voice, avoid cliches
  - Admissions wants to know: their motivation, how they work with others, response when things get tough
  - Supplemental essays
  - COVID essay
- **Pay application fees**
  - \$50-100
  - Fee waivers

# Application Process - Additional Components

- Request Letters of Recommendation
  - 1 counselor letter. 2 teachers max
  - Check school websites
  - Outside letters
- Send official High School Transcript
  - *Request through counselor*
  - Discussion with counselor
- Send SAT scores
  - 20-21 test-optional/test-blind
  - Student's send through [collegeboard.org](https://collegeboard.org) or [act.org](https://act.org)
- Send Q1 and Midyear grades

## *Test-Optional Means Test-Optional*

“I understand that there is a lot of confusion around how colleges will manage the test optional process, and this has made it extraordinarily difficult for students to make decisions around testing. I want to emphasize that under no circumstances should students put their health and safety at risk in order to apply to BU. I can say with complete confidence that **a student who applies to BU test optionally will not be at a disadvantage in our admissions process.**”

While SAT/ACT results have been a part of our application process, we have always taken a holistic approach to our decision making. Grades, strength of curriculum, essays, extra-curricular activities and recommendations all remain important components of our admission review.

“If you do not submit test scores, you will not be disadvantaged during the application review process this year. We will equally consider students who submit standardized testing, those who are unable to sit for standardized testing this year, and those who submit their scores past our normal deadlines. Our holistic review process - meaning that each candidate is evaluated on multiple factors beyond simply grades, test scores, and other quantifiable metrics - is made for this very type of situation, and is dedicated to ensuring that students who are unable to take traditional standardized tests are not disadvantaged, compared to students who submit scores.”

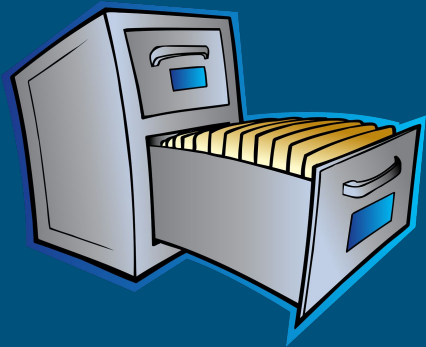


# Who's Responsible for What?
