A Message from Superintendent, Joseph B. Goho

Now that the school year is in full swing, I'd like to take a moment to highlight the academic accomplishments of our students. As educators, and as the families we serve know well, the primary function of a school system is to improve student achievement and academics. With that in mind, we recently received our data for the 2023 state testing on RICAS in grades 3-8 and the PSAT/SAT in grades 10 and 11, as well as the related school accountability rankings by the R.I. Department of Education. In general, we were relatively pleased at our results, as North Providence students demonstrated progress in many areas especially the fact that four elementary schools improved in all three tested areas, ELA, math and science. While we are close to reaching our pre-pandemic levels at most schools, we know that there is much work to be done to catch-up our



students and ensure there is recovery from the lost learning that occurred throughout the pandemic. However, we are cautiously optimistic about our RICAS and PSAT/SAT results which showed that significant improvement and growth are attainable. While we know that there is much work to be done to close achievement gaps for all students, the recent state testing results indicate that a solid foundation is in place for continued growth and improvement. Some estimates state that it could take 3-5 years for students to recover from pandemic learning loss. However, North Providence Public Schools has implemented numerous interventions to ensure that our students improve more quickly. Currently our principals and teachers are reviewing school level data to identify areas for improvement, and all schools are working with the central office to develop and implement specific action plans to ensure that meaningful improvement and growth continue to occur. North Providence Public Schools also continues to implement new high-guality written curricula in ELA, math, and science which are available online to all students and families. Lastly, there is a professional development plan in place to ensure that high quality instruction and rigorous learning occur daily in every classroom. Working together as an invested school community, we have no doubt that with the support of our talented principals, teachers, and support staff members, our students will continue to excel and graduate college and career ready.

An update from Assistant Superintendent, Louise K. Seitsinger:

Happy New Year! It's been a wonderful start to 2024! We have many things we are working on at all levels, including continuing to revise our ELA, Math, and Science Curriculums. We are in our second year of implementation for StudySync at the Middle Schools and NPHS with success. We are also in our second year of implementing Reveal Math for the Elementary schools and NPHS, third year at our Middle schools. We are in the third year of implementing Amplify Science in Grades K - 8. We are experiencing a great deal of success with these and other curricula resources to best support all of our students' learning needs. With these highquality curricula along with professional learning, we expect it to have a positive impact on our students' achievement. We are continuing professional learning through curriculum team meetings, grade level meetings, content level meetings and



more, to address alignment and improvements in our curriculum. We are also conducting Learning Walks across all of our schools in ELA and Math to improve instructional practices. We are looking forward to including Science into our Learning Walks soon. We are continuing to add instructional resources and supports for our multilingual students and special education students across all grade levels. Our goal is to continue to decrease achievement gaps for all of our students and increase achievement levels. We are looking forward to our annual District Spelling Bee for students in Grades 4-8 on February 1, 2024! It's always a positive and successful experience for all! This year it will be held in person at McGuire Elementary School. Stay tuned for more details. In the spring, we are also working diligently to respond to our state assessment and accountability data across all schools. Through our district and school strategic plans and school improvement plans respectively, we are specifically addressing our student achievement data with measurable goals and action steps for improved outcomes this year. We are getting prepared for all of our state assessments beginning at the end of March and ending in May. Best wishes for Health and Happiness in 2024!
